Dear Vice Mayor Neighbors and Members of Council:

Yesterday, Mayor Karl Dean announced plans to go forward with a capital spending plan for the Metropolitan Government. While Mayor Dean unveiled major elements of that plan, I wanted to provide the Council with the complete list of projects being financed and additional information about the plan and why we propose moving forward at this time.

As you know, this plan represents this Administration and this Council's first plan to finance important projects for this community. Prior efforts to move forward were curtailed by dramatic movements in the municipal bond markets. Market conditions have now stabilized and we are comfortable proceeding forward.

In addition, we took this time to completely reassess all of the projects previously approved and the process by which these plans come before the Council for review and approval. That is why today, we are filing two resolutions.

The first is designed to clean up the process by deauthorizing all projects previously approved but not started—in fact, some of these approvals are 10 years old and no longer a priority. By cleaning this up and adopting the second resolution, the Council will know exactly which projects are proceeding forward and the citizens of Nashville will know how their tax dollars are being spent.

The second legislation is a new initial bond resolution authorizing bonds to be issued for approximately \$560 million in projects.

General Government	\$328 million
Schools	\$156 million
Self-Funded Projects	\$76 million

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Of the general government total, some \$62 million represents new projects with the remainder projects approved in prior plans. In addition, there is a list of general government and self-funded projects totaling \$172 million that will not be funded at this time.

As I said during the budget presentation last week, we must put additional money into our debt service funds next year. This is true regardless of whether we move forward or not with the capital spending plan. Soon after taking office, it became clear that more projects had been approved than we could afford.

We have curtailed millions of dollars of projects and clearly identified those we believe important for our City at this time recognizing that our resources are limited now and for the foreseeable future.
