New! War Memorial Auditorium Documentary

The historic War Memorial Auditorium, long considered to be one of Music City's premier performance and civic venues, recently released a five-minute documentary to highlight the auditorium's deep connections to the city's musical and political history. The short film can be seen at the auditorium's new website, www.wmarocks.com.

Narrated by 650 AM WSM Radio personality Eddie Stubbs, the film is the result of a year-long research collaboration with numerous city and state archives and other partners. Over its five-minute run time, the film takes the viewer on an entertaining journey through the history of the auditorium from before its opening in the early 1900s, its dedication in 1925, the Nashville Symphony years, the Grand Ole Opry years, the countless political and civic events and, finally, the significant contribution

as a music venue for a broad spectrum of music artists and genres over the years.

Since its dedication in 1925, the historic War Memorial Auditorium has become popular with artists and audiences for its world-class acoustics, open floor and seated configurations, and charming Neoclassical aesthetic. The venue has served as home to the Nashville Symphony (1925-1980) and the Grand Ole Opry (1939-1943), and it remains a premier concert venue for Nashville.
