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MHC/MHZA UPDATE

Marker News!

Following the disappearance of the McConnell Field marker earlier this year, the West Nashville Founders Museum and the Metropolitan Historical Commission replaced the marker, with revised wording. The new McConnell Field marker was erected in late November 2013.

McCONNELL FIELD

In 1927 the City of Nashville bought 131 acres from Warren Sloan and made this the city airport, named for Lieut. Brower McConnell, Tennessee National Guard pilot who died that year in an air crash. Aircraft outgrew the field in the 1930s and moved to Sky Harbor and Berry Field. The Works Progress Administration constructed the McCabe Golf Course, named for former Park Commission Chairman Charles McCabe, in 1939-1940.

The West Nashville Founders Museum also provided support for the placement of a marker for Richland Park, which was erected along Charlotte Avenue near the entrance to the Richland Park Branch Library, in late November 2013.

RICHLAND PARK

Once a part of the Byrd Douglas plantation, the Nashville Land Improvement Company dedicated ten acres for a public park in 1887. After annexation, the park became a Nashville City Park in 1907, and the City added playground equipment. Richland Park hosted many community events such as ice cream socials, band concerts, outdoor movies, and sporting events. The community center opened in 1932, and was converted into the Richland Park Library in 1961-62.

Save the Date! Nashville Conference on African-American History and Culture

On February 14, 2014 join Tennessee State University's College of Arts and Sciences and the Metropolitan Historical Commission for a celebration of the contributions of African Americans to Nashville and Tennessee history. For over thirty years, this award-winning conference has brought together historians, students, educators, community leaders, and others interested in African-American history and culture. This year's conference will focus on the educational and musical legacies of Nashville's African-American community to our city and state.

Dr. Sonya Ramsey of the University of North Carolina-Charlotte will focus on the legacy of African-American schoolteachers in Nashville, the subject of her recent book, *Reading, Writing, and Segregation: A Century of Black Women Schoolteachers in Nashville*. Several of Ramsey's interviews come from our own Conference attendees! Ramsey's book has been called "groundbreaking" and "fascinating" by reviewers.

Dr. Don Cusic will speak on educator, poet, and activist James Weldon Johnson. Janet Walsh with the TSU Libraries and Beverly Robertson with the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis will highlight the research and interpretation of the African-American experience at their institutions. In commemoration of the Sesquicentennial year of the Battle of Nashville in the American Civil War, Norm Hill will join Dr. Tim Johnson to discuss the Civil War experiences of Nashville's African Americans during the Battle of Nashville.

Save the Date! Third Annual Old House Fair

The Metropolitan Historic Zoning Commission and partners are pleased to announce the third annual [Old House Fair](#) on Saturday March 8, 2014, 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. at The Martin Center, 2400 Fairfax Avenue, Nashville.

The Old House Fair is a FREE day-long festival that introduces property owners to new ideas, practical advice, innovative materials, and quality services through exhibitors, presentations and hands-on demonstrations. The event includes door prizes and the opportunity for children to learn more about historic architecture through guided craft projects.

Lectures and hands-on demonstrations focus on enhancing energy efficiency, maintaining and restoring old houses, and appropriate design elements for the architectural styles and eras found here in Nashville. “We will have a full range of sessions,” said historic zoning administrator Robin Zeigler, “everything from how to make an old house more energy efficient, to how to navigate the Metro permitting process, to how to repair old windows or make a decision on replacement windows.” Even if you are not a DIYer, these sessions will help you know what to look for and what to ask for when planning projects for your old home. The entire schedule of lectures and hands-on demonstrations and exhibitor’s list will be available online at www.oldhousefair.org after the first of the year.

Participants will have a chance to talk to exhibitors and get advice and information on their specific projects. Exhibitors include companies that specialize in old houses, and retailers and artists who cater to owners of Antebellum, Victorian, Bungalow, Tudor and Mid-century Modern homes.
