The Nashville Civil War Lecture Series accompanies the recent release of an exciting new Civil War brochure. "Nashville's Civil War Stories: Common People in an Uncommon War" tells Nashville's Civil War story though the eyes of twelve Nashvillians who represent the many perspectives of the war and its effects on the lives of those in our city. The brochure connects these Civil War stories to 24 Civil War sites, including homes, cemeteries, churches, and schools. Along with several battlefield sites, these are the places where Nashvillians fought to survive and struggled to cope during wartime and the years of Reconstruction. "150 Sounds of Freedom" October 10-13, 2013

The Afro-American Historical and Genealogical Society (AAHGS) will hold its 34th National Genealogy Conference from October 10 – 13, 2013, at the Inn at Opryland, 2401 Music Valley Drive, 37214. Participants will have an opportunity to attend a series of workshops and programs in celebration of Music City and the sesquicentennial anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation. Each year family historians and genealogists from California to Florida gather to seek answers to discovering their family roots. This year's theme, "150 Sounds of Freedom" endeavors to bring together persons from diverse backgrounds, distant geographic areas, and similar interests to continue this tradition.

Conferees will have the opportunity to meet authors and guests, exchange information and ideas, and network with attendees from around the country. The conference will consist of broad choices of workshops and speakers with over 30 sessions, focusing on resources, research methods, historic events and our ancestors who have paved the way. Experienced historians and genealogists will lecture on subjects targeting the beginner, the advanced, the hobbyist, and professional researchers. Attendees may shop with vendors and exhibitors, showcasing an assortment of genealogical software, resource books, apparel, and ethnic collectibles.

New! Nashville Trail of Tears Memorial Ceremony

Observing The 175th Anniversary Of The Trail Of Tears Sunday, October 27--Noon

Cumberland River Greenway Amphitheatre, Nashville, Tennessee Please join the Native History Association and the Tennessee Trail of Tears Association to commemorate the 175th Anniversary of the Trail of Tears on Sunday, October 27, 2013, from 12:00 to 1:00 pm.

Over 11,000 Cherokee people walked the Trail of Tears through the city of Nashville during the fall of 1838 on their forced immigration to Oklahoma. A memorial ceremony in observance of their passage 175 years ago will be held at the Cumberland River Greenway Amphitheatre located on the Gay Street Connector in downtown Nashville, near the place where the Cherokee crossed the Cumberland River.

Scheduled speakers are local journalist, historian, and educator Albert Bender, and Vicky Garland, board member of the Tennessee Trail of Tears Association.

The amphitheater is located on the Gay Street Connector between Church Street and Woodland Street, just south of the Woodland Street Bridge. It can be accessed on foot from the Gay Street Connector or 1st Avenue North. Metered parking is available along the Gay Street Connector, and at various pay lots and garages in the downtown Nashville area.
