New! Exciting News for Music Row

Nashville's Music Row Deserves a Future as Bright as its Past!

Last year, RCA Studio A on Nashville's famed Music Row was threatened by demolition. Built by the RCA Corporation and opened in 1965 as the premier sound engineering marvel of its time, the studio's client list reads as a "Who's Who" of music legends and modern-day musicians. Everyone from Dolly Parton to the Beach Boys, Elvis Presley to Keith Urban, and many more have recorded at Studio A. Ben Folds

served as the public face of the Save Studio A campaign after his company was given an eviction notice this summer by the developer who purchased the building and planned to demolish it to build condos and a restaurant.

Studio A was saved in the 11th hour by preservationist Aubrey Preston, who was recently joined by Chuck Elcan and Mike Curb to form Preservation Partners, a nonprofit organization that will manage the building.

The near-demolition of Studio A has sparked a broader discussion in Nashville — how does the community encourage development while still keeping the "music" in Music Row?

Additionally, 2015 is a milestone year as Music Row celebrates its 60th anniversary as the center of the sounds of American music and the historic RCA Building marks its 50th year under new ownership.

For over thirty years, the Metropolitan Historical Commission and Tennessee State University have celebrated the contributions of African Americans to Nashville and Tennessee through the Nashville Conference on African-American History and Culture. The 2015 conference continues this tradition, focusing on unsung heroes in Tennessee history from slavery through the 20th century. The speakers scheduled for this year include Belmont professor and noted author Dr. Sybril Bennett, and Tennessee State Historian Dr. Carroll Van West. Continuing the Conference's long-standing commitment to honoring the contributions of African-Americans to Nashville's cultural scene, the Nashville Public Library's Wishing Chair Productions will stage "Anasazi the Spider," in honor of the rich story-telling traditions of the African-American community.

New this year will be the airing of the winning student documentaries from 2014's Tennessee History Day competition. Students from Memphis and Knoxville received honors for the best Tennessee projects in African-American History, sponsored by the Nashville Conference Committee, at the 2014 competition. These will be honored for their work, and their documentaries will be screened at the conference.

Built by the Hyde Family, this amazing antebellum home totals 2,580 sq. ft. on a lovely .98 acres. Additionally, the home is known as one of the houses used by Jesse

and Frank James during their time in the Bordeaux and Jordonia communities. The owner is very interested in selling the house to a preservation-minded individual or group. The sale price is \$75,000. Nashville 101: Nashville History from its Beginnings to the Civil War

Thursdays in February—10:30 a.m. to Noon Fort Negley Visitors Center

Would you like to learn more about Nashville history? Davidson County Historian Dr. Carole Bucy will teach a series of classes to help Nashvillians tie the historic places they see around town to the story of our history. Beginning with Native peoples who followed animals to the salt lick near a bend in the Cumberland River, "Nashville 101" will follow the Robertson and Donelson parties who settled the area and founded Fort Nashborough through Tennessee statehood, Nashville's rise as a commercial center, its designation as the state capitol, Nashville as the Athens of the South, and its strategic location during the Civil War.

Classes will be held at the Fort Negley Visitors Center for four consecutive Thursdays, beginning on February 5, 2015 (Feb. 5, 12, 19, and 26), from 10:30 to noon. Space is limited, so reservations must be paid in advance. The cost is \$25.00. All proceeds for this series of "Nashville 101" will benefit the *Encyclopedia of Nashville and Davidson County* project.
