



### SFIA 2015 Activities With the Highest Participation




### SFIA 2015 Activities With the Lowest Participation





## TELEPHONE SURVEY SUMMARY

## Methodology

- Survey conducted by Survey Sample International
- 45 | adult Nashville residents
- The survey has an error rate of +/- 4.6% for the total sample at a 95% confidence level
- Blended survey:
  - 176 online (random panel sample)
  - **275 telephone** (60% landline, 40% cell phone)
  - Optional Spanish-language interviewer









## **Demographics**

The study's sample was similar to the actual adult population in Nashville




## Frequency of Use

- 64% of residents visit a park or park facility on a regular basis (at least once or twice per month)
- 21% have participated in a Parks program
- I 5% of respondents don't use parks or facilities for the following reasons:



## Most Popular Uses of Parks and Greenways



## Rating of Metro Parks and Greenways

- 88% of respondents who have participated in programming within the past year rate the quality of programming as excellent or good.
- 82% of respondents think the value, appearance and recreational opportunities of parks and greenways are excellent or good.
- 68% of respondents think the Parks Department is doing an excellent or good job maintaining the physical condition of the parks relative to its budget constraints.

## Perceived Safety

90% of residents say they feel very safe or somewhat safe when they go to a Metro Park.

79% of residents say they feel very safe or somewhat safe when they go to a greenway.







## **Funding**

- 77% of residents strongly or somewhat agree that Metro should provide additional funding to the department when informed of the gap between Metro's per capita budgeting for parks compared to the national average.
- 94% of residents strongly or somewhat support the Parks Department preserving more green space and acquiring additional property to develop new parks and greenways.

## **Funding**

 65% favored new investment at existing parks and facilities versus spending on developing new facilities.

49% of residents strongly or somewhat agree that Metro Parks should increase program fees so that specific users are paying a bigger share of costs.
