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Juneteenth—Freedom Day Celebration

There were enthusiastic attendees and a little something for everyone at the second annual Juneteenth at Fort Negley. The African American Genealogical and Historical Society of Tennessee, Inc. (TAAGHS) partnered with the Jefferson Street Merchants Project (JUMP), Metro Nashville Public Schools, and local neighborhood associations to make this event possible. In the theater, reenactors with the 13th U.S. Colored Troop presented our nation's colors, the MET Singers and Princely Players sang the Battle Hymn of the Republic and other lections, a Frederick Douglass reenactor made a speech, and student essay contest winners were announced. The National Council of African American Women sponsored lunch. Outdoors, on the walk leading to the fort, there were booths ranging from nutrition awareness and vaccines to games and face painting. The Nashville Public Library showed part one of "The Abolitionists," one of the films featured in the National Endowment for the Humanities *Created Equal* series, as a reminder of a few people and events that made such a freedom day celebration possible. It was a fantastic opportunity to join the long-standing tradition of Juneteenth and come together in celebration of freedom, family, and unity in our community. An all-around fun time was experienced by all.
