# AGENTS OF THEIR OWN DESTINY: RACE AND REMEMBERANCE IN A CIVIL WAR CITY Events to commemorate and celebrate the Sesquicentennial of the Civil War's Battle of Nashville



Lipscomb University is hosting a variety of events throughout September, October, and November in commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the Battle of Nashville. The kick-off symposium, featuring James Lee McDonough, Dr. Carole Bucy and Tonya Staggs, will be held at Historic Travellers Rest on Thursday, September 18 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

Every Saturday in October from 9:00 AM to Noon, David Currey will lead tours of important Battle of Nashville sites, such as Fort Negley, Peach Orchard Hill, Travellers Rest, and Granbury's Lunette. You don't want to miss this opportunity to hear from the historian who served as Fort Negley's interpretive planner and designer of the Civil War exhibit at Bicentennial Mall.

On Saturday, November 15, from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., Lipscomb University will host a symposium entitled "The African American Experience in the Civil War" featuring James McPherson, Joseph Glatthaar, and John Baker.

Lipscomb University will host the Civil War on the Silver Screen in September and October at Ward Hall at 7:00 p.m. Featured films include, Glory on Tuesday, September 30; Lincoln on Tuesday, October 14 and Copperhead on Tuesday, October 28.


