Bird Research and Projects in the Warner Parks

- 1. The Warner Park Bluebird Nesting Box Project started in 1936 and is one of the oldest continuously run projects in the U.S. 50 Boxes monitored regularly April August by a team of volunteers and coordinated by Diana McLusky. Over 100 nestlings banded each year.
- 2. Long-term Spring Migration Banding Project four to six sessions each season and a public day.
- 3. Long-term Fall Migration Banding Project four to six sessions each season and a public day.
- 4. Winter Banding Project sessions each Tuesday January February and a public Saturday session.
- 5. Monitoring Avian Productivity and Survivorship (M.A.P.S.) a project of the Institute of Bird Populations and endorsed by the USGS Bird Banding Laboratory. Ten 6 hour sessions in the breeding season, May August. Ongoing project in the Warner Parks since 1991.
- 6. Breeding Bird Survey 25 points covering Percy and Edwin Warner Park. Ongoing since 1985.
- 7. Purple Martin Nest Box Project boxes monitored February August. Nestlings banded.
- 8. Hummingbird Migration Banding Project 6 8 sessions and a public day, Aug-Sept. Coordinated by Heather Gallagher. Ongoing since 2002.
- 9. Coordination of Hummingbird Migration Banding Projects at Bells Bend, Beaman and Shelby Bottoms Nature Centers 4-6 sessions in August and September. Bells Bend Project coordinated by Kathy Shaw; Beaman and Shelby Bottoms coordinated by Sandy Bivens.
- 10. ProjectFeeder Watch a project with the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology and National Audubon Society, ongoing at Warner Park since 1997. November April. Coordinated by Melissa Donahue.
- 11. Saw-whet Owl Migration Study coordinated by Kathy Shaw. October February
- 12. eBird a project of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology & National Audubon; Warner Park bird account and banding account with current and historical records. Ongoing since 2015.
- 13. Feather Research a project with the Center for Tropical Research at UCLA. Coordinated by Allison Salas, Warner is one of the first sites in the southeast to participate. Ongoing since 2015.
- 14. Bird Counts a project with the TN Ornithological Society; spring, fall, winter counts held annually.
