



more people living in the Metro Region by 2040

By 2040, no ethnicity will be a majority of residents.






## **DEMOGRAPHICS**

## Residents and employees


By 2040, Davidson County may have more employees than residents.



At the same time, more of Nashville's residents will be over the age of 65. For every 3 people of prime working age, another 1 person will be over 65.

## Workers and retirees

## Housing

Nashville has 200,000 Millennials, or people born between 1980 and the early 2000s, making it a city with a vibrant future ahead - and a challenging one when it comes to housing. Add to the mix 140,000 Baby Boomers who may seek to downsize as they retire, and the demand for new and different types of housing could dramatically increase.





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
